CADASTRAL SURVEYORS LICENSING BOARD OF NEW ZEALAND

Summary

The past year has seen some changes in the Board's membership. Brett Gawn retired as Chairman and the Board formally recorded its appreciation of Mr Gawn's outstanding contribution during his 17 years as a member of the CSLB. Marion Miller completed her 3 year term and the Board appreciated her important contribution as the lay member. Belinda Greer and Adina Thorn (substitute) are the new lay members. Craig McInnes is the new substitute member who is also a licensed cadastral surveyor. Neale Faulkner has been elevated to full membership.

The Board was pleased to see a reduction in the number of misconduct complaints against cadastral surveyors who had allegedly failed to meet the required standards for cadastral survey during the last 12 month period. However, there was an increase in the number of significant failures reported to the Board by the office of the Surveyor General where there was a failure to comply with the Rules for Cadastral Survey. The Board has resolved to work collaboratively with the profession and the Surveyor-General to better understand the reasons for this, as well as an increase in the level of requisition rates for surveys when they are first lodged with LINZ.

The Board is pleased to work with the Council for Reciprocating Boards of Australia and New Zealand (CRSBANZ) to review standards that surveyors need to achieve to be granted a licence to conduct cadastral surveys across the eight Australian jurisdictions and New Zealand.

The Board is to undertake a review of its Standards over the next 12 months, so they better reflect the competencies required of a Cadastral Surveyor as required under the Act. There has been an increase in the number of licences issued during the year, showing that the profession and the Board's licensing regime are capable of responding to market demand. The Board will be looking to liaise further with the Survey School at Otago University to discuss the inhibitors to an increase in the number of graduates. It is critical for the Surveying profession and the NZ Titles system that we maintain a steady stream of qualified cadastral surveyors.

Inland Revenue has advised the Board that it will be liable for income tax following a review of its Public Authority status. This means that the Board will be subject to income tax from 1 July 2017. This is not expected to have any significant financial consequences for the Board.

An increase in the annual Licence renewal fee this year was required to cover the review of the competency standards, engaging of an accountant to prepare a tax return, and possible tax liability.

The Board continues to provide information to the Parliamentary Counsel Office's Access (ASIP) Project which is about standardising the way legislation deals with instruments made under empowering legislation. This should ultimately improve the online accessibility of the Board's Standards which are made under authority of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002.

Jurisdiction

The Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand is constituted by section 10 of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002.

Functions

The functions and duties undertaken by the Board are set out in section 11 of the Cadastral Survey Act. (See Appendix A).

In summary, the primary function of the Board is the licensing of suitably qualified surveyors with current competence to conduct cadastral surveys and lodge them in the cadastral record. For this purpose, the Board sets standards for the education and the practical experience required to obtain and retain a cadastral licence.

The Board exercises disciplinary powers in cases where a cadastral surveyor is charged with negligence, incompetence, falsification, or failure to observe the Rules for Cadastral Survey. The Board has the authority to suspend or cancel a licence, or place a surveyor under the supervision of another licensed cadastral surveyor, where professional misconduct is proven.

Licences are renewed annually.

In addition, the Board participates in reciprocity arrangements with the eight Australian State and Territory boards.

Membership

Under section 13 of the Act the following board members were appointed by the Minister of Land Information on 1st December 2016 for 3 year terms.

The Board members as at 30 June 2017 are:

- Mr Neale Charles Thomas Faulkner and Ms Vicki Alma Nalder, re-appointed as nominees of bodies representing licensed cadastral surveyors pursuant to section 13(2)(a);
- Ms Merryn Kay Maguire and Mr Anthony Paul Nikkel re-appointed pursuant to section 13(2)(b);
- Ms Belinda Mary Greer, being a person who is not and never has been a licensed cadastral surveyor and is not employed in the surveying profession, appointed pursuant to section 13(2)(c);
- Surveyor-General, Mark Dyer, as an *ex-officio* member of the Board pursuant to section 13(1)(b);
- Mr Craig Kenneth McInnes appointed as a substitute member of the Board.
- Ms Adina Thorn appointed as a substitute lay member of the Board.

Meetings

The Board met four times in the 2016/17 year, on:

5 August 2016

18 November 2016

24 February 2017

9 June 2017.

One teleconference was held on 29 November 2016.

Licences

The table below shows the number of licences issued over the last five years. In the table:

- “Renewed” means the number of licenses renewed at 30 June 2016.
- “New” means the number of initial licenses issued during the year.
- “Re-applied” means the number of licenses issued to surveyors who failed to renew by 30 of June 2016 or had let their licence lapse for some time.
- “Non-renewals” means surveyors who chose not to renew their licenses and deceased surveyors.

The continuing increase in the total number of licences issued is encouraging, however there has been a decline in first time applicants this year. The increase is mainly due to more surveyors (15) renewing their licences since June 2015. There will be an increase of 3 more surveyors re-licensing for the next 12 months – 2017/2018. The Board expects that the number of surveyors holding a licence to keep rising steadily over the next few years as demand for cadastral surveyors is maintained.

The number of women continues to increase - from the 43 women in 2011, but the number of Maori is still very small. The Board would like to see increased gender and ethnic diversity in the profession in the future and urges the profession to continue its efforts to achieve that.

There are 8 more younger surveyors in the 20-29 age group compared to last year.

The Board issued Letters of Accreditation to 3 New Zealand surveyors seeking registration in Australian States, compared with 5 last year. This continues the downward trend in recent years in response to increased demand in New Zealand. The Board also approved 2 licence applications from surveyors returning from Australia.

The number of enquiries (6) from overseas surveyors about becoming licensed in New Zealand is similar to last year (7).

This year the Board recognised surveying degrees from Poland, China, Macedonia and Zimbabwe as meeting its academic standards for licensing. In most cases when applicants present surveying degrees from countries other than New Zealand or Australia these degrees are assessed by the Bureau of Assessment of Overseas Qualifications to establish if they meet the Board's standards for licensing. Since 2002, the Bureau has also assessed degrees from France, Greece, Mauritius, Philippines, South Africa (Natal), and USA (Minnesota) as meeting its Standards and being equivalent to a four year surveying degree in New Zealand or Australia.

Discipline

The Board received no complaints that were within its jurisdiction relating to the misconduct of surveyors.

There were three complaints about professional ethics received from members of the public. As the Board is not responsible for these matters they were referred to the NZIS, the professional body that represents the wider survey industry.

The Surveyor-General advised the Board of 15 notices of a significant failure to comply with his standards in accordance with section 7(1)(d) of the Act during the year, compared to 9 in 2015/16 and 15 in 2014/15. The Board monitors the surveyors who have been notified to the Board under this section in the previous three years. As part of this monitoring, the Board takes a more in-depth review of these surveyors on a case by case basis before deciding whether to renew their licences. In some cases, the Board has asked applicants for additional information to confirm their competency before renewing their licence.

Licensing Standards

The Board will review the Standards and what they aim to achieve as set out under Sec 11(1)(d) of the Cadastral Survey Act. The Board sees a need for a broader statement of the objectives and outcomes of the Standards which could be modernised to take a more outcome-based approach to the competencies that licensed surveyors will require.

The NZ Institute of Surveyors (NZIS) is undertaking a full review of the competency requirements for all surveyors including those in the cadastral stream. The Board is working closely with the NZIS to ensure that any revised competencies meet the Boards standards for a licensed cadastral surveyor.

This is very important as the Board recognises the admissions process conducted by the NZIS as evidence that applicants applying for initial licences meet the required competencies.

The National School of Surveying at the University of Otago, is the only university in New Zealand that offers degrees in surveying. The Board will be carrying out a review of the curriculum as it relates to cadastral surveying over the next 12 months to ensure that the content meets the competencies for a licensed cadastral surveyor.

Reciprocity

Reciprocity between the New Zealand and Australian surveyors' boards has existed in some form since 1892. The Board collaborates closely with the Australian boards on the assessment of other overseas qualifications for equivalence to the New Zealand and Australian degrees and setting policies for the education, training, and regulation of surveyors.

Contact with the Australian State and Territory boards is maintained through the CRSBANZ that comprises of the Chairs of each board. Meetings of the CRSBANZ are generally held once per year, this year one meeting and one teleconference was held.

CRSBANZ has recently completed an initial review of competency standards required by the various jurisdictions. This should assist in easier transfer of post graduate experience between jurisdictions.

CRSBANZ has also agreed to support the introduction of accreditation of university degrees to align courses between New Zealand and Australia. This would ultimately assist course transfer between universities.

The activities of CRSBANZ are of significant value to New Zealand surveyors, and promote closer economic relations between Australia and New Zealand.

Finance

The Board is funded entirely by licensing fees gathered annually from licensed cadastral surveyors. The level of those fees is set by the Board under section 11(1)(c) of the Act. The Board closely reviews its operating costs and continually seeks ways to ensure it works efficiently.

The review of competency standards and the need for the Board to meet its new tax obligations has required a small increase to the licence fee from \$207 to \$220 for the 2017/18 year to maintain the Boards financial position. The Board has contracted accountancy firm StaplesRodway to review its tax position and to prepare future tax returns.

Administration

The Board continues to contract the Institute of Professional Engineers New Zealand (IPENZ) to provide administrative and accounting services, office facilities, and meeting rooms. IPENZ maintains full time office hours, dedicated telephone and email point of contact, and hosts the Board's website. This is considered to be a very valuable arrangement for the Board.

Mr Robert Buchanan of Wellington acts as the Board's legal adviser, and Mr Phil Napper is contracted as the Board Secretary.

APPENDIX A: FUNCTIONS AND DUTIES

The functions and duties of the board, as set out in section 11 of the Cadastral Survey Act 2002 are:

- (a) To maintain a register of cadastral surveyors licensed under this Act.
- (b) To receive applications for licences under this Act as cadastral surveyors and to issue licences in proper cases.
- (c) To set fees for the issue and renewal of licences under this Act.
- (d) To issue and update standards that persons applying for licences, or the renewal of licences, under this Act must meet.
- (e) To investigate complaints about cadastral surveyors and take disciplinary action in appropriate cases under this Act.
- (f) To provide statistical information to the Minister about cadastral surveyors as requested by the Minister.
- (g) To perform such other functions or duties conferred on it by this Act or any other enactment.

Report on the Performance Report

Opinion

We have audited the performance report of Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand on pages 14 to 22, which comprises the entity information, the statement of service performance, the statement of financial performance and statement of cash flows for the year ended 30 June 2017, the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2017, and notes to the performance report, including statement of accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion:

- a) the reported outcomes and outputs, and quantification of the outputs to the extent practicable, in the statement of service performance are suitable;
- b) the accompanying performance report presents fairly, in all material respects:
 - the entity information for the year then ended;
 - the service performance for the year then ended; and
 - the financial position of Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand as at 30 June 2017 and its financial performance, and cash flows for the year then ended

in accordance with Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-For-Profit) issued in New Zealand by the New Zealand Accounting Standards Board.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit of the statement of financial performance, statement of financial position, statement of cash flows, statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) (ISAs (NZ)), and the audit of the entity information and statement of service performance in accordance with the International Standard on Assurance Engagements (New Zealand) ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Performance Report* section of our report. We are independent of Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 (Revised) *Code of Ethics for Assurance Practitioners* issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Board, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Our firm carries out other assignments for Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand in the area of tax advisory. The firm has no other interest in Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand.

Other information than the financial statements and Auditor's Report Thereon.

The Board Members are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the Annual report (but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon), which is expected to be made available to us after the auditor report date.

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand is a Body Corporate constituted by and operating under the Cadastral Survey Act 2002 (the Act).

The Board consequently sets standards relating to the competencies and practical experience required for the licensing of surveyors. The Board also exercises certain disciplinary powers as set out in Part 4 and Schedule 2 of the Act.

The membership of the Board consists of:

- (a) 5 members appointed by the Minister in accordance with section 13 of the Act; and
- (b) the Surveyor-General.

The Board continues to contract the Institution of Professional Engineers New Zealand (IPENZ) to provide administrative services, office facilities, and meeting rooms.

The Board is funded entirely by licensing fees gathered annually from licensed cadastral surveyors. The level of those fees is set by the Board under section 11(1)(c) of the Act.

NOTES TO THE PERFORMANCE REPORT
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a. Basis of Preparation

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of less than \$2,000,000.

All transactions are reported using the accrual basis of accounting.

The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

The performance report is presented in New Zealand dollars. All numbers presented have been rounded to the nearest dollar, unless otherwise stated.

b. Revenue

Annual licence fees for cadastral surveyors are invoiced in April of each year in advance for the following financial year. Licence fees are recognised as revenue in the period they pertain to when cash is received. Licence fees received that relate to the following financial year are treated as income in advance.

Interest income is recognised on an accruals basis.

c. Goods & Services Tax (GST)

The entity is GST registered. All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for debtors and creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

d. Income Tax

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand is exempt from income tax on the basis that it falls under Section CW38 of the Income Tax Act 2007. However from 1 July 2017, the Board will become a tax paying entity.

e. Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank and Cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances.

f. Accounts Receivable

Debtors are carried at estimated realisable value after providing against debts where collection is doubtful.

g. Investments

Investments held with a registered trading bank are classified as current assets if they have maturities of between three months and one year. Those with maturities greater than 12 months after the balance date are classified as non-current assets.



h. Accounts Payable

Accounts payable are recorded at the amount of cash required to settle those liabilities. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

i. Changes in accounting policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies during the annual period (2016: Transitioned to Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-for-profit)).

2. NATURE AND ACTIVITIES OF THE BOARD

The Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand was established by and operates under the Cadastral Survey Act 2002. This Act requires cadastral surveys to be carried out by, or under the direction of, a licensed cadastral surveyor, who must meet the standards for competence and licensing set by the board.

3. ANNUAL CADASTRAL SURVEYORS LICENCE FEES

Cadastral Surveyors Licences expire on 30 June each year. Applications for renewal may be lodged at any time after 1 April for the following twelve month period commencing 1 July.

Annual subscriptions are invoiced in April each year. A number of applications for renewal are received and paid in advance during the period between 1 April and 30 June each year. These licence fees received in advance are shown separately on the Statement of Financial Position and are taken up as income in the financial year to which they relate.

4. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand had no contingent liabilities as at balance date (2016 Nil).

5. COMMITMENTS

Cadastral Surveyors Licensing Board of New Zealand had no commitments as at balance date (2016 Nil).
